## GREETINGS FROM THE CHIEF JUSTICE

Once again I want to bring warm greetings to our readers from the entire Eastern Caribbean Judiciary and the people we serve. The month of May was a very active month for the judiciary as we prepared to participate in the World Intellectual Property Organization's two-day workshop on intellectual property. Preparatory work was also in high gear for the hosting of a Judge's Conference after the Workshop.

As our readers may very well be aware, our Justice Reform Project is going forward and the Civil Justice Reform aspect of the project is near completion. A very important phase was the production of our court rules. The new *Civil Procedure Rules [CPR 2000]* should be delivered from the press very soon and be available throughout our jurisdictions. The transition period from the old rules to the new will conclude at the end of next month. There is an air of anticipation and excitement as our legal and judicial institutions and local Bar await the rules. I can assure you there will be no disappointment. The new rules will not only modernize our civil practice but will bring more efficiency to our jurisprudence and the dispensation of justice. The rules will harness a civil practice that significantly reduces the delays that usually characterise developing judiciaries in contemporary democratic societies.

## HIGH COURT

### St. Lucia

#### Special Sitting in Honour of the Late Leroy Marcellus Frederick

The late Leroy Frederick, Attorney-at-Law and Registrar of Lands passed away on 4<sup>th</sup> May, 2001.

On Friday May 11, 2001 His Lordship, the Honourable Chief Justice Sir Dennis Byron presided over a Special Sitting of the High Court in honour of the life of the late Registrar. Also in attendance on the Bench was his Lordship Honourable Denys Barrow (Ag.).

Addresses included representative of the Honourable Attorney General, Mrs. Lorraine Williams, President of the St. Lucia Bar Association and Mr. Parry Husbands, QC who presented Mr. Frederick's petition to be admitted to practice at the Bar in St Lucia in 1979.

Mr. Frederick's close friend and colleague former Director of Public Prosecutions Mr. Errol Walker fondly reminisced of their days at University in Cave Hill, Barbados. All speakers expressed admiration for Mr. Leroy Frederick, he having left his indelible imprint on St Lucian history being the first police officer to qualify as an attorney-at-law.

Mr. Frederick's body lay in the foyer of the Court for viewing and after a short procession to the Holy Trinity Anglican Church for the funeral service. His body was laid to rest at the Choc Cemetery.

## **COURT OF APPEAL**

### **Swearing in of Justice Joseph Archibald, QC**

Mr. Joseph Samuel Nathaniel Archibald, QC, Attorney-at-Law, Tortola, BVI was sworn in by His Lordship, the Honourable Chief Justice, Sir Dennis Byron, as an Acting Justice of Appeal of the Eastern Caribbean Supreme Court on Monday 8<sup>th</sup> January 2001.

Mr. Archibald was sworn-in during a short ceremony, attended by members of the Judiciary, Queens Counsel, the Solicitor General, the Director of Public Prosecutions, the President of the St. Lucia Bar and the President of the Senate. The Chief Registrar and staff of the Eastern Caribbean Supreme Court, Court of Appeal and the Press were among those present the ceremony held at the Headquarters of the Eastern Caribbean Supreme Court, Saint Lucia.

Justice Archibald served as a High Court Judge in St. Lucia during the period 16<sup>th</sup> February to 30<sup>th</sup> April 1998.

Justice Archibald's assignment as Justice of Appeal is from 1<sup>st</sup> May to 31<sup>st</sup> July 2001. The Court extends a hearty welcome to him.

### **OECS Judicial and Legal Reform Project Steering Committee**

The inaugural meeting of the Project Steering Committee for the OECS Judicial and Legal Reform Project was held in St. Lucia on May 9<sup>th</sup> – 10<sup>th</sup>, 2001. The Committee met

to discuss the project implementation plan. The mandate of the Committee is to provide oversight and guidance to the OECS Judicial and Legal Reform Project. It is responsible for reviewing and endorsing annual work plans and performance measurement reports, as well as providing strategic direction to the project.

The Project Steering Committee was created under the Memorandum of Understanding between the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) and OECS member states. It consists of representatives of OECS member countries, Attorneys General and representatives from organizations with an interest in justice system issues. It is intended that this Committee should meet twice per year, unless special circumstances warrant additional meetings.

The Honourable Chief Justice, Sir Dennis Byron is the Eastern Caribbean Supreme Court's representative on the Project Steering Committee.

### **USAID/Jamaica – Administration of Justice Results Committee**

The Results Committee Meeting for the Regional Administration of Justice Program financed by USAID/Jamaica was held at the Glencastle Resort Hotel in St. Lucia on May 15<sup>th</sup>, 2001. The Honourable Chief Justice, Sir Dennis Byron was invited to participate as a member of the USAID Caribbean Regional Program Administration of Justice (AOJ) Results Committee.

The purpose of the regional justice program is to increase the efficiency and fairness of legal systems in the Caribbean. The program is regional in nature with emphasis on the Eastern Caribbean. The primary beneficiaries of this program will be the people of the Eastern Caribbean.

### **Human Rights Issues in the Caribbean**

The Honourable Chief Justice, Sir Dennis Byron delivered a speech on “Human Rights Issues in the Caribbean and its Impact on Policing” on Friday May 25<sup>th</sup>, 2001 at the Meeting of the Association of Caribbean Commissioners of Police held at Bay Gardens Hotel, St. Lucia.

## **NEW DEVELOPMENTS IN THE COURT**

### **JEMS Go-Live in the British Virgin Islands, Dominica and Grenada**

The month of May proved to be very busy for the Court Offices in the British Virgin Islands, Dominica and Grenada. Each of these offices commenced using the JEMS software for the management of the cases filed with the High Court.

The High Court Registry in Road Town, Tortola, went live with the JEMS software during the week of May 7, 2001 with Mr. Victor de La Cruz from PCSS Inc. and the IT Manager from the Court of Appeal Office, providing on-site go-live assistance to the Court Office. The High Court Registries in Dominica and Grenada also went live with the software during the weeks of May 14<sup>th</sup> and May 21<sup>st</sup>, respectively. The IT Manager from the Court of Appeal Office in St. Lucia provided assistance to the Court Offices in Dominica and Grenada.

All of the civil cases filed for the year 2001 were entered during the weeks of the go-live exercise and the Court Office staff each country was provided with follow-up training on Case Entry, Case Scheduling, Criminal Case Entry and entering ticklers.

In addition, some time was spent with the staff from the Information Technology Department of the Government of the British Virgin Islands to provide them with direct training on various aspects of the JEMS software.

Tortola was one of the more advanced countries in terms of readiness of the Court Office for the implementation of the JEMS software. The entire Court Office has already been networked and the Court House which is located in a separated building, is also networked to the Court Office server by way of a leased circuit. Unfortunately as a result of the recent fire at the High Court Office in Tortola, the link to the Court House was not operational. We were therefore unable to install the JEMS software on workstations in the Court House in the Judge's Chambers, for the Judges Secretaries, and for the Court Clerks in the court rooms. However, this situation would be addressed when the local Information Technology Department in the British Virgin Island completes this task.

During the month of June work will be taken to continue the implementation of the software package at the Court Offices in the remaining islands.

## CONFERENCES, SEMINARS AND WORKSHOPS

### **Workshop on Appellate Court Improvement Proposals Under the Civil Procedure Rules, 2000**

On Thursday 24<sup>th</sup> May 2001 a workshop was held at the Eastern Caribbean Supreme Court Headquarters in Saint Lucia on proposals for improvement of the Appellate Court under the *Civil Procedure Rules 2000 [CPR 2000]*.

This workshop is the first in an intended series organised to engage discussion on the Recommendations of the *Lipscher Report*. The primary objectives of the workshop were to examine and analyse the recommendations of the report; to identify and institute implementation strategies and to produce a report and implementation plan for circulation to each Court Office.

The workshop brought together several persons in every sphere and level of the Judiciary in Saint Lucia including Justices of Appeal, High Court Judges, Registrars, Magistrates and key Court Office Staff. Mr. Justice of Appeal Albert Redhead was the Chairman of the workshop.

Our esteemed Honourable Chief Justice Sir Dennis Byron began the workshop with an interactive presentation using Power Point where His Lordship outlined and examined the recommendations made by the Report for structuring a comprehensive plan for a modern OECS Judiciary.

The Honourable Joseph Archibald, QC, Justice of Appeal [Ag.] gave an overview of the Appellate process as contained in Part 62 of the CPR 2000 and highlighted new processes which did not exist under the *Court of Appeal Rules 1968*.

The workshop ended with a combined interactive presentation delivered by Mrs. Ianthea Leigertwood-Octave, Chief Registrar, using Power Point to outline the new role and functions of the Court Office or the Lower Court under the CPR 2000. This presentation was followed by a practical demonstration by Registry Clerk, Miss Cynthia David of the use of the JEMS Software in the management of Appeal Cases.

It is intended that out of workshops such as this a common vision of the future will be agreed upon and a strategic plan for implementation formulated. A Strategic Planning Committee will be created to identify issues and resources and prepare a basic design for the plan. It is envisaged that the entire process of formulating and adopting the Plan will be of duration of 12 months.

The importance of obtaining feedback from members of the Judiciary on the *Lipscher Report* was underscored, as this would in some measure determine the successful implementation of the Plan within the prescribed timelines.

#### **Meeting of the Organization of Commonwealth Caribbean Bar Associations (OCCBA): Nassau Declaration on Financial Services**

The Organization of Commonwealth Caribbean Bar Associations (OCCBA) adopted the Nassau Declaration on Financial Services at a meeting held at the Radisson Cable Beach Hotel, Nassau, Bahamas on the 24<sup>th</sup> day of May, 2001. The following is the full text of the Declaration:

*Considering that the position of the Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) does not respect Rule of Law, sovereignty, non-interference in internal affairs, the presumption of innocence;*

*Recognising that money laundering should be unlinked from tax competition;*

*Believing that the policy of the OECD is economic terrorism against international financial centres and that the fiscal sovereignty of all countries should be respected;*

*Believing that the OECD countries should apply to themselves the same rules they seek to impose upon the international financial centres and establish a level playing field;*

*Noting that as a cartel, the OECD position undermines sound business and economic principles - the principles of comparative advantage, free*

*competition and trade in services, economic development and economic diversification - preys on the vulnerability of small countries and promotes protectionism;*

*Suggesting that it is not in the self-interest of the countries of the North to destroy the financial sectors and economic prospects of these countries.*

*The Organization of Commonwealth Caribbean Bar Associations Resolves that:*

- 1. No country or economic or political grouping should dictate the tax system of another country or economic or political grouping;*
- 2. The international financial centres should be removed from the blacklist and the policy of shaming countries should be discontinued;*
- 3. The policy of the OECD of imposing so-called defensive measures which are in fact offensive should be discarded;*
- 4. The OECD should desist from using the threat of blocking and excluding transactions from international financial centres from financial and securities markets and clearing and settlement systems in the United States of America and the United States should treat that threat with the contempt that it deserves;*
- 5. OCCBA should review this matter on an ongoing basis including at its special meeting in September, 2001;*
- 6. This resolution should be known as "Nassau Declaration on Financial Services".*
