## EASTERN CARIBBEAN SUPREME COURT NEWS

### OECS Judiciary Modernization

During the month of September, Mr. Robert Lipscher completed his third consultancy with the Eastern Caribbean Supreme Court.

The Consultancy which took place over a 40-day period, during the months of August and September, was sponsored by the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) to assist with the modernization of the judiciary with particular emphasis on:

1. providing recommendations for strengthening the administrative framework of the court system in member states of the Eastern Caribbean; and
2. reviewing the requirements for improving the financial independence of the courts.

The report from the consultancy, which was presented in draft to the Honourable Chief Justice during the month has been accepted and presented to USAID. It provides a broad overview of a strategic plan for the Court as it relates to the development of various divisions of the court and administrative linkages between the Magistrates Courts and the High Courts, along with a strategy for improving financial independence.

Once USAID's review process for the report has been completed, it will be made available.

As an immediate first step in the implementation of the recommendations, the Hon. Chief Justice, headed a delegation which met with the BVI Court Review Committee to provide some information on the plans of the court for the development of various divisions and in particular the establishment of the Commercial Division of the Eastern Caribbean Supreme Court.

Plans are also being developed for the establishment of other divisions of the court including Criminal, Civil, Small Claims, Traffic, and Family.

## CONFERENCES, SEMINARS & WORKSHOPS

### Second Inter American Seminar on Judicial Management *Using Information to Govern the Judicial Branch*

The Second Inter American Seminar on Judicial Management took place from September 24-26, 2003 at Hotel La Condesa in Heredia, Costa Rica. The Eastern Caribbean Supreme Court was represented by Honourable Justice Adrian Saunders, Justice of Appeal, and Ms Geraldine St. Croix, Statistician.

The event attracted over a hundred delegates from Latin and Central America, as well as from Spain. There were also representatives from donor agencies, USAID and World Bank

The Chief Justice, Luis Paulino Mora held a welcome reception on the afternoon of September 24 at the Supreme Court building in San Jose, the capital of Costa

Rica. The Chief Justice and Monica Nagel, a member of the Justice Studies Center of the Americas Board of Directors, expressed their gratitude that participants took time off their busy schedules to come together to discuss and share ideas on such an important topic.

Thursday September 25 was the first day of the formal presentations and discussion sessions. The first topic presented was by Juan Enrique Vargas, Executive Director of the JSCA on *Judicial Government: What is the Purpose of Information?* The focus of his presentation was on *Judges and Information; Information Systems and Judicial Institutions in the context of Judicial reform*. Generally, this paper focused on a research conducted by the JSCA on judicial information systems and its usage in judicial governance. The presentation was followed by a question, answer and comment session in which participants, especially those from the Latin American countries took part in a lively and lengthy discussion focusing on issues relevant to their situations.

This session was followed by a panel discussion, in which Honourable Justice Adrian Saunders was a panelist. The panelists gave an overview of their various experiences as it related to the use of information in judicial governance, the reform process and the role that an information system plays.

The second topic dealt with, *Concrete Experiences using Information* and was presented by the following:

The presenters focused on projects which involved intense use of information in the design, follow up or evaluation of judicial policies. Discussions were also held on what sort of information should be used, and the difficulties encountered in the processing of such information. Some discussions were also held on the differences between statistical data and other types of information.

This session was also followed by a panel discussion where panelists highlighted some examples that were unique to their experiences and system. The day's sessions ended with a dinner where presentations were made by Don Luis Paulino Mora, and Juan Enrique Vargas on the 5<sup>th</sup> volume of the publication: *Sistemas Judiciales* and a CD; Spanish version of the *Status of the Justice in the Americas*. The JSCA promised that an English version would soon be made available.

The first topic on the day 2, Friday, September 26, was on *Building a Judicial Information System*, presented by Santos Pastor. The presenter drew on the ideas expressed in the manual "*Coding and De-coding*", which was presented in a draft format at a Statistics workshop held in St. Lucia in April, 2003. A final version was given to all participants.

The second session focused on *Technological Tools and Judicial Information* and was presented by various businesses specializing in this subject area. The presenters displayed software packages used for processing and presenting judicial statistical data. This session was also followed by a panel discussion on the topic: *Introducing Technological tools*. Ms Geraldine St. Croix, Statistician was one of the panelists for this topic. The panelists discussed their practical experiences encountered with the use of information technology in the judicial system. The session ended, again, with lively comments and discussions by participants.

The seminar ended on Friday 26 at about 7.00 p.m. Participants were given Certificates of Participation.

**PCSS 10<sup>th</sup> Annual User Conference,**  
**September 9<sup>th</sup> - 12<sup>th</sup> 2003,**  
**Hilton Myrtle Beach Resort, Myrtle Beach SC**

The Eastern Caribbean Supreme Court, with financial support from USAID, coordinated the participation of eight [8] court personnel, from the Caribbean Region, to the 10<sup>th</sup> PCSS Annual User Conference held during September 9<sup>th</sup> - 12<sup>th</sup>, 2003 in Myrtle Beach, South Carolina. In Addition to the Court Administrator and the IT Manager of the Eastern Caribbean Supreme Court, the OECS participants included Florry Leach and Andre Gittens from the High Court Registries of St. Vincent & the Grenadines and Grenada, respectively. The other four participants were from Jamaica and Trinidad & Tobago; each represented by two participants.

The User Conference was attended by over seventy-five [75] participants from the USA, including Texas, Utah, Kansas, and South Carolina and of course participants from the Caribbean. It provided a fruitful environment for networking of JEMS users, and an avenue for the sharing of experiences and knowledge in the implementation and use of case management systems. In particular, users from the Caribbean, including the Bahamas, profited from the occasion to discuss various technology-related issues and agreed to the formation of an electronic discussion forum as a first step towards the sharing of ideas and the “unification of forces” for the additional benefit of ensuring that the region gets sufficient support towards the sustenance of technology in its Court System.

Most significantly, though, the conference provided users the opportunity to meet the various trainers and developers of JEMS and to get first hand training in the use of several new features of JEMS. Several workshops were conducted in

key areas such as: (1) Scheduling & Dockets; (2) The new JEMS 4.6 GUI Enhancements; (3) Imaging and Scanning; (4) Courtroom Processing; and (5) Warrants.

The workshop ended with a demonstration by the PCSS's main Application Developer of some of the latest court-related technologies associated with JEMS. Some of the Technologies highlighted included : (1) Digital Signatures, using a peripheral called e-pad <sup>TM</sup> ; (2) Web Inquiry for viewing case information and for processing of transactions, and (3) Interactive Voice Response (IVR) for providing users with the opportunity of keying case numbers to obtain voice data on cases in question.

As part of the USAID and CIDA sponsored computerization of Magistrates Courts in two Pilot Countries, the ECSC has coordinated three Trainings session in the Case Management systems JEMS , presently being used in all high Courts in the sub region. ## JUDICIAL EDUCATION INSTITUTE

In September, the JEI continued to meet its mandate for enhancing the system of justice through education and training for all levels of the judiciary. To this end, there were two programmes which JEI organised, namely, a Lawreporting and Headnote Writing workshop, and an Orientation Programme for New Judges.

### 1. Orientation programme for newly appointed Judges

The Orientation programme for two newly appointed Judges, (Justice Clare Henry-Wason, and Justice Francis Belle), was held at the Head Quarters of the Eastern Caribbean Supreme Court on 12<sup>th</sup> September, 2003. The activities sought to provide the new judges with the basic knowledge, skills, techniques and awareness required to perform their judicial responsibilities impartially, competently, efficiently and effectively. Topics addressed were centred around the following broad areas:-

Independence and Accountability

Aspects of Civil Procedure

Aspects of Criminal Procedure

Sentencing

Trial Management with Automated Recording Processes

JEMS

Court Administration

In addition, attention was given to exposing the newly appointed judges to the plethora of materials available to Judges in the dispensation of their judicial responsibilities. To this end, a selection of available literature was packaged in booklet form for each participant, who was also given an ECSC CD, and a copy of the Civil Procedures Rules 2000.

### 2. Lawreporting and Headnote Writing Workshop

The Lawreporting and Headnote Writing Workshop was held at the Windjammer Landing Resort, Bois d'Orange, St. Lucia, and a total of 48 participants attended from all over the Caribbean. The workshop sought to facilitate the continued publication of the OECS Law Reports by putting in place a cadre of professionals, committed to the development of indigenous Law reporting.

The workshop examined the role of Law Reporting, Techniques in Headnote Writing, Completing the Headnote, the Review of Headnotes and Preparation of Publication of Headnotes.

## FROM THE OECS

### ST. LUCIA

#### The New Law Year

Monday the 15<sup>th</sup> September 2003, marked the opening of the New Law Year.

At the invitation of the Senior Magistrate, I attended the activities to mark this auspicious occasion. It was indeed a distinctive pleasure to have been in the warm presence of the representatives of the Law and to witness such a grand event on the Justice's Calendar. Below is my impression of the day's activities.

Members of the Justice System, namely Lawyers, Magistrates and Judges accompanied by the St. Lucia Police Band, attended a Church Service at the Holy Trinity Anglican Church, where they were exhorted to make the best judgments possible, according to Isaiah 61:8. They were reminded that God is the Chief Justice and that every decision they make, they would be held accountable. Afterwards there was a procession from the church to the High Court.

The High Court was filled to capacity as the representatives of the Law decorated the courtroom in their long black robes. A minute of silence was observed in respect of Justice Phillip of Antigua who sadly passed away on September 5, 2003, after having served the Justice System for ten (10) years.

Justice Indra Hariprashad-Charles spoke sternly concerning the disharmony amongst members of the Bar, and admonished them to sow deeds of integration amongst themselves in order to portray the true picture of the True Justice System.

A few members of the Bar gave speeches, which captivated an already engrossed audience as opinions were shared. Finally, we were graced with the presence of Technology itself, as we listened to and viewed the live broadcast from Antigua by the Honourable Chief Justice, Sir Dennis Byron. He delivered an address with his usual commensurate adeptness, to simultaneous sittings in each Member State and Territory within our jurisdiction by computerized video link to each courthouse. He spoke of the computerization of the Court system throughout the Caribbean and also gave a general report of the progress and problems faced by the OECS Member States.

Being telecast in this manner, served to emphasize the fact that although the jurisdiction of the Eastern Caribbean Supreme Court is spread geographically across the several member states, that we are essentially one.
